

A.C. Frieden Meets Members of Venezuela's Political, Diplomatic, and Academic Communities

CARACAS, Venezuela (July 12, 2007) – Novelist A.C. Frieden arrived in Caracas to continue his research for his upcoming political thriller, *Where Spies Go To Die*. In hopes of better understanding the complex political environment in Venezuela, which is an important part of his book, Frieden interviewed key personalities from the country's political, diplomatic, academic, business and literary communities. "This is an opportunity of a lifetime, to meet people whose political and social experiences have contributed to Venezuela's contemporary political landscape," said Frieden, who is driven by an attention to detail and accuracy that forces him to travel extensively on-site for his research, no matter how far the location.

One such interview was with Herma Marksman, a historian of Spanish and German descent who spent nearly ten years as "the other woman" at the side of President Hugo Chávez Frías during his rise to power in the late 1980s and through his imprisonment in the early 1990s. Herma once shared Hugo Chavez's passion for a new Bolivarian revolution, having helped Chavez organize his political movement and the 1992 coup. But now she considers herself part of the opposition, disillusioned by Chavez's empty promises and what she characterizes as his ever-growing hunger for power. In 2002, she and noted political analyst Alberto Garrido co-authored the book *El Otro Chavez*, a portrayal of Hugo Chavez through her eyes.

Frieden also interviewed various local and foreign government officials and representatives, including Benedict Gubler, Chargé d'Affaires, Embassy of Switzerland in Venezuela, as well as members of academia, including Professor Romelia Hurtado de Vivas, a Caracas native and professor at Eastern New Mexico University who arranged several of Frieden's interviews; Professor Aida Bexama Farias, University of Chili in Santiago; and Dr. Carmen Sweeting, Principal, Colegio Internacional de Caracas. Frieden also had extensive discussions with several *chavistas*,

including attorneys, sociologists, a government ombudsman, state engineers and a medical doctor, all of whom are senior activists who help maintain popular support for Hugo Chavez

Frieden also spent time scouting venues throughout downtown Caracas, including La Plaza Bolívar the Casa Natal El Libertador (house where Simón Bolívar was); the 17th-century La Casa Amarilla (now the Ministry of Foreign Affairs); the El Capitolio Nacional (the seat of the legislative council); the Miraflores Palace (the presidential palace) and the Palacio Blanco. He also visited the neighboring colonial town of El Hatillo and the mountainside village of Galipán, for venues that could be added into interesting scenes of his new book.
