


## Author A.C. Frieden Looks for the “Perfect” Crime Scene in Holland

**AMSTERDAM, the Netherlands (Oct. 10, 2009)** – Chicago-based author-lawyer A.C. Frieden arrived in Holland for a short stay to research a new fiction novel and to fly for his new aerial photography book. “It’s wonderful to be back,” Frieden said. “Having been here once before many years ago, I relished this opportunity to return, this time with several literary projects in mind.” Amsterdam is not only a capital, but a thriving, historical, and multicultural city of one and a half million inhabitants and one of the largest and economically important metropolitan areas in Europe. But the city is also known for its unusual traits, ranging from cannabis-serving “coffee shops” to legalized brothels. “What fascinates me about this place,” Frieden adds, “is the strange mix of accepted vices, its multiethnic fabric and its coexistence with the rest of what is essentially a conservative country – all of which can spice up a novel.”

Holland’s capital has been featured in numerous internationally marketed novels, such as *Widow For One Year*, by John Irving; *Amsterdam* by Ian McEwan, *Outsider in Amsterdam* by famed Dutch crime novelist Janwillem van de Wetering (who died last year), and *The Good Thief’s Guide to Amsterdam* by British lawyer-author Chris Ewan, among others.

From scenic, tranquil urban canals, to crowded coffee-shops, to tree-lined streets and decades-old pubs, Amsterdam continues to fascinate and draw authors from around the world. “It didn’t take me long to find a half-dozen sites around town that could work well in my manuscripts,” Frieden said in day two of his stay in the city.

Amsterdam has a number of other unusual sites, such as the Torture Museum, which includes a collection of instruments of torture from the late Middle Ages to the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century. Frieden also toured several of the less frequented residential areas, again searching for possible scenes and other aspects that may be useful in his current literary projects. “Amsterdam offers contemporary authors a diverse assortment of locales,” commented Frieden as he strolled along small side streets leading to Leidsestraat, one of the main avenues downtown.

Frieden also used his time in Holland to collect additional photographs for his non-fiction literary project: an aerial photography book planned for release in 2010. Frieden is a licensed private pilot and often flies as part of his book research trips.
